NEW – AND UNWELCOME - CHALLENGES AHEAD FOR THE TCC

For more than two decades now the Tasmanian Council of Churches has had two income streams. Member churches have contributed (a total of \$30,000 in 2006) and Christian World Service (CWS) has contributed (a total of \$46,000 in 2006).

CWS has recently reviewed its operations, with particular reference to the proportion of income spent on promotion of the Christmas Bowl and other appeals. As a result of this review it is likely that CWS will fund its Tasmanian work with a grant of \$10,000 p.a. effective 1 July 2007. Other states have also received funding cuts but Tasmania's is the most substantial.

This will result in a dramatic fall in the TCC's income. We will not be able to maintain our current staffing levels, and probably not maintain a city-centre office. In addition much of the work currently undertaken by our General Secretary, Rev Tim Matton-Johnson and our Administrative Assistant, Mrs Jenny Roddam, will need to be undertaken by volunteers, or let go altogether.

The office-bearers of the TCC have been carefully considering the implications of the CWS decision and its impact on the future life and work of the TCC. To inform this consideration there have been helpful and continuing conversations with the Heads of Churches, as well as with the TCC Executive.

We are quite committed to the TCC continuing – even if in a more limited role. Your office-bearers remain strongly committed to pursuing the ecumenical agenda in Tasmania and to identifying ways through which the churches of Tasmania can co-operate to bear witness to the wider community of the unity we have in Christ, and to the common tasks of the worship and service of the one God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Many decisions will need to be made by the TCC in the coming weeks. I ask for your prayers for the Executive and also for Tim and Jenny as we face this unwelcome challenge. I expect that our next newsletter will outline the way the Executive has responded to the new challenge.

In this Easter season we proclaim that out of suffering and death new life came. May the new life that comes out of our present struggle strengthen the TCC for the years to come.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 20-27 MAY 2007 WEEK OF PRAYER FOR RECONCILIATION 27 MAY-3 JUNE "He even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak" (Mark 7:37)

In 2007, the resources for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity had their origin in the experience of Christian communities in the South African region of Umlazi, near Durban, a region deeply affected by unemployment and poverty, but most of all by HIV/AIDS.



For the churches in Umlazi carrying out their ministry under these

circumstances, the "visible unity of all Christians" is far more than a theological concept. Facing the reality that the human suffering caused by the Aids pandemic and other dehumanising forces is threatening to overwhelm the divided churches, they believe that the churches can be agents of healing only when they themselves are healed, when they are truly the one body of Christ. Then, churches can break the silence, and speak out with a single voice and reach out as a single body, acting with compassion and in unity.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity concludes on the Feast of Pentecost and leads straight into the Week of Prayer for Reconciliation beginning on 27 May. Christians in Australia, therefore, are invited to continue their prayers for the unity of the Church with a commitment to prayer and work for reconciliation through justice for Indigenous people.

SCHOOL CHAPLAINCY IN TASMANIA

Enclosed in this mail-out you will find a copy of a recently produced generic brochure on School Chaplaincy.

The brochure is the work of the Chaplaincy Working Group (CWG) – which is part of the TCC's Commission on Christian Ministry in State Schools (CCMISS) – in response to heightened community awareness of and increased demand for school chaplaincy services since the announcement of the federal government's National School Chaplaincy Program (NSCP) on 29 October 2006. This program gives schools the option of applying for up to \$20000 pa for 3 years to employ a chaplain as part of their student support service structure.

The TCC outsources the management of chaplaincy services to Scripture Union (SU), which currently employs chaplains in 20 high schools, district high schools and secondary colleges around the state. These chaplains are managed and supported by Local Chaplaincy Committees (LCCs) which are widely representative of the local Christian community.

The advent of the federal funding program implies a number of things which you are invited to comment on, act upon and pray about:

 a) the federal funds will not pay the existing salary hours of chaplains. Hence it is essential for the sustainability of chaplaincy programs in schools, for LCCs to maintain and even increase the financial support they receive from churches and individuals. There is no guarantee of federal funding beyond the 3 year life of this program;

- b) the number of schools applying for federal funding to employ a chaplain for the first time, means that we will be seeking appropriatequalified and experienced people who feel that God is calling them to this ministry. Tabor College has launched a new course in school chaplaincy in 2007, and people considering applying to become chaplains are encouraged to enrol for this in 2008;
- c) there will as well be an obvious need for more LCCs to support the new chaplains. This is an area where you may be called to serve God in your local community. A new LCC, representative of all churches in the town, has been formed this month in George Town to manage the chaplaincy services at Port Dalrymple School and South George Town Primary Schools (which have applied for federal funding), and another in Nubeena. There will be more – that's for sure!

We believe that God is already at work in each school community. Our task is to complement and enhance that through the ministry of chaplaincy. School chaplaincy is one of the most effective ways in which churches can invest their resources in their local communities. I urge you to encourage chaplains in their work – which isn't easy! – and to use your networks and contacts to move towards establishing new chaplaincies.

SOLOMON ISLANDS EARTHQUAKE AND TSUNAMI



An 8.0 magnitude earthquake that triggered a tsunami that measured between two and 10 metres in places, struck the Solomon Islands at 07:40 local time on Monday 2nd April, killing at least 20 people, leaving thousands homeless, and destroying at least 13 villages in the most severely affected Choiseul and Western Provinces.

Ruth Liloqula from the Lauru Land Conference based in Choiseul, reported that two metre high waves travelled up to 200 metres inland, causing major property destruction and contaminating drinking water. "It is indeed a very big concern and I just hope that our people got to safer ground," Liloqula said. Her family home, which had already been damaged by the rise in sea level, was swept away by the tsunami.

CHRISTMAS BOWL AT WORK

Funds from the Christmas Bowl, Partners4Peace and Emergency programs of CWS in 2006 and from the Australian Agency for International Development (AusAID) have been sent to partners in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, and the Pacific, for 44 **aid** projects (**a**ssistance in emergencies, **in**justice, and **d**evelopment and poverty reduction).

Assistance in Emergencies

"The continuing support from our partners and others who provided contributions is received with full appreciation, especially when it has been given during the emergency situation in our land, and our very difficult circumstances of need and poverty", said Constantine Dabbagh from Gaza, in a recent email from CWS's partner, the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees.

Injustice

In the Solomon Islands literacy workshops for women facilitated the extension of training in village and provincial areas.

"The women are very enthusiastic and eager to see it continue and expand. Those who have been trained are organising themselves to run literacy classes within church and village networks. A goal of the project is to enrol 1,000 new students.

"Church women leaders have plans for a national literacy outreach project and will work together with the Literacy Association of the Solomon Islands", CWS's partner, the Solomon Islands Christian Association, reported.
