REPORT FROM TCC ANNUAL MEETING

On Saturday 14 May, the Annual Meeting of the Tasmanian Council of Churches welcomed the Rev'd Professor James Haire as the keynote speaker for the occasion. James Haire is the President of the National Council of Churches in Australia and Director of the Australian Centre for Christianity and Culture. He gave an inspirational and challenging address entitled The Unity of the Church: What can we realistically achieve now? He highlighted a number of issues being faced by the Australian church at this time: *Identity; Mission;* Organic Unity of the churches; Intercommunion; Relationships; Pragmatic Christianity; Proliferation of Christian expressions—including the growth of the Pentecostal movement, the Evangelical and Charismatic Churches.

HIROSHIMA DAY COMMEMORATION SERVICE

St. David's Cathedral 10.30 am on Saturday 6 August

Cathedral at 10.30 am on Saturday 6 August, the 60th Anniversary of the dropping of an atomic bomb on Hiroshima. Church, Parliamentary and Civic Leaders are being invited to join representatives of Schools, Defence Forces, RSL and other faith communities to remember those whose lives were devastated by this tragic event and to reflect

on its significance for today. During the service representatives of these groups will be invited to light candles, or place paper cranes, to mark the occasion.

The Singers of Southern Tasmania (which includes the Friends Singers and the Spring Bay Singers), under the leadership of Mr. Rod Grosvenor, will perform excerpts from *The Armed Man—A Mass for Peace* by Karl Jenkins.

Forceten's Project for July is focused on Oy Mbang village in Cambodia's Kompong Thom Province where twenty families were forced to leave their homes. The government soldiers had laid landmines and the area became riddled with unexploded ordinance. Six years later some families needed the nearby land for farming and decided to return to their original homes. Not long after they returned a landmine killed a family member.

Forceten's partner, Church World Service Cambodia, heard about the plight of these people, and organised a de-mining project in the area. In July 2004, the de-mining teams started their work and by October 13,287m² had been cleared. 3 mines, 2 UXO and 8,121 fragments were found.
