The 'Lund' Principle

Should not the churches act together in all matters except those in which deep differences of conviction compel them to act separately?

"We offer the treasure of our faith in the frailty of our personal witness, our communities and our ecumenical achievements" are the opening words of intercession in this year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity worship service. We are invited to celebrate the flame lit by God in the hearts of believers and their communities though they come from many different cultures, people and nations. We are reminded that "We hold this treasure – this gift – in earthen vessels...therefore we do not lose heart..." 2 Cor. 4:4-18.

At a time when the world yearns for peace and justice, the Easter season and the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity gives us an opportunity to revisit our response to local and world needs. Our desire to offer hope is not always easy to translate into practical ways because of the restrictions of resources, time and finance. However, when we share a vision, plan and take action together, we are able to achieve so much more, as well as supporting and caring for each other along the way. office; you may like to check out the resources on the NCCA website at www.ncca.org.au before ordering - the poster and prayer cards are particularly eye-catching.

I will be conducting a seminar, together with Rev'd Aileen Fitzgerald, in Launceston on 2nd May to explore the work of churches together in partnership (details p.4). On this occasion we will look at the wider role of the TCC and include the work of Christian World Service in which Aileen is involved. This prompts me to remind you that I will travel *anywhere in the state* to conduct workshops or seminars on issues related to the ecumenical journey. These occasions can be shaped appropriately for church gatherings at the local level; they need to be hosted by one of our member churches but open to all Christian denominations.

May the season of Easter take us back to hear and respond to the dying words of Jesus that His followers may all be one.

TCC ANNUAL MEETING—SATURDAY 3 MAY 2003

Saturday 3 May is the date of the TCC's Annual Meeting for 2003. This will be held at the **Kings Meadows Salvation Army Citadel, 16-20 Kay Street, Kings Meadows, Launceston from 9.30 am-4.00 pm.**

The keynote speaker will be the **Rev'd John Henderson, General Secretary of the National Council of Churches in Australia.** His address, titled *Ecumenical Impressions: Churches and Ecumenism in the 21st Century* will be at 11.40 and will cover relationships of the Churches, internationally and nationally.

The TCC's General Secretary, the Rev'd Val Graydon, will speak about the ecumenical journey on a local level, incorporating the **Tasmanian Launch of the Decade to Overcome Violence.** This could not be happening at a more relevant time when we consider the devastation of the situation in Iraq at present.

The water is inevitably dirty and diarrhoea and other diseases plague your family. This is what life is like for over 1 billion people in the world, including 72% of rural Zambians.

If you want to know the facts and want to do something about this sort of injustice, then you can order a Simply Sharing Kit NOW (available free of charge) from the TCC office in Hobart (6234 2543) or from Aileen Fitzgerald in the north west (6431 2780). A life-changing video on water in Zambia is also available (cost \$10). THE COMMISSION ON THE GOSPEL AND HUMAN RELATIONSHIPS

The Commission on the Gospel and Human Relationships meets bi-monthly under the convenership of the Rev'd Peter Weeks. The Commission seeks to assist churches and the wider community to reflect on issues relating to gender, human sexuality and bioethics.

As one way of fulfilling its mandate, for some years the Commission has organized a series of Seminars on the four Tuesdays in March. Subjects over the years have included: Death and Dying, Human Sexuality, Reconciliation, Money, Punishment This year the topic was *Stewardship* and a report prepared by Peter Weeks follows:

Stewardship: The Use and Abuse of Resources and Means

“Being born into the human race endows everyone with awesome responsibilities. Even before growing up, everyone is obliged to make decisions

which reflect this responsibility—or lack of it. How well we make these choices and the way in which we exercise responsibility which is our birthright is, basically, a measure of our stewardship. The more we understand the world in which we live, the more aware we become of the intertwining web of our decisions. What I decide—the exercise of my responsibility—I discover, affects not myself only but, in varying measure, every living thing.”


We invited 8 speakers to share with us at the Friends' Meeting House over the 4 Tuesdays in March. These were people who have personal experience of exercising or thinking about stewardship in a range of areas from forests to family, from vows of poverty to the whole sweep of Christian tradition, from National Trust to City Council.



An average of 28 people per night joined in the conversations. It was apparent that many more issues were raised than could be fully addressed at the time. The conversations and reflections continue. How do we balance the competing demands that are placed upon us? Where is the line between appropriate and inappropriate use of resources? How do we weigh up the “facts” that are presented to us? What criteria or filters do we use to assess them? These were just some of the questions raised.

We are very grateful for the way in which each of the 8 speakers shared something of themselves and their own journey with us.

2003 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 1-8 June



This year, in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, we are invited to celebrate and praise God for the unity we share in Christ. The text for 2003 (*We hold this treasure - this gift - in earthen vessels Therefore we do not lose heart ... 2 Corinthians 4:5-18*) was chosen by an ecumenical group in Argentina – a country where there have been many waves of immigration, which

have affected both their national context and the churches. As Australian Christians, we link our prayer and quest for the unity of the churches with our responsibility to share the light of Christ – ‘the treasure in clay jars’ – and to welcome strangers into our midst.

National Sorry Day 26 May Week of Prayer for Reconciliation 27 May—3 June



Australians will commemorate National Sorry Day on 26 May, followed by the Week of Prayer for Reconciliation from 27 May – 3 June. These events remind us how far Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians have travelled to date and the journey ahead.

In Hobart on 26 May, a March will leave the Rose Garden, near the Railway Roundabout at 11.15, arriving at Parliament House at midday. The program will include speakers, a barbeque, music and time to share stories.
