Advent Message from the President

We can't drive very far these days without encountering road works. As we see the new roads emerging, I am reminded of the cry of St John the Baptist: "Prepare the way of the Lord: make his paths straight!" (Mark 1, 3). We reflect on this passage each year during Advent as we recall the coming of Christ among us.



I have always loved the Season of Advent. Perhaps for us in Tasmania, where it is linked with the beginning of summer, it reminds us of new life, a time of expectation, waiting and joy. These feeling are reflected in Nature – the longer days, the freshness of the mornings, the sunshine, the green of new growth, the colours of the flowers and the song of the birds.

As a teenager, I remember each evening during Advent opening the little flaps on the Advent Calendar with the younger members of my family. This memory led me to think about the surprise encounters with God that happen each day in our own lives. Perhaps Advent is a good time to reflect each evening on where we have encountered God through the day and where we were able to bring the light of Christ into someone else's life by a welcoming smile, an encouraging word, a thank you for a service received, or sharing a moment to listen with care to the concerns of another.

As we look forward to spending time with family and close friends, it is heartening to see the generosity of people who think of others who are lonely or less fortunate than themselves and try to ensure that they too share in love and friendship at this time.

Let us pray that God will teach us what he wants us to do and that we will walk His light, in the paths he has chosen (cf Isaiah 2,5). May we bring the Light of Christ to our world each day – in the midst of wars, suffering, fires, drought, power struggles, hatred and division – a world so much in need of peace and reconciliation.

Deployment

TCCEM was activated in all three regions of the state as a result of the fires in January and February this year. More than 60 volunteers were deployed to 9 locations across numerous weeks. The busiest location was the Huonville Evacuation Centre but teams were also sent to Queenstown, Miena, Bothwell, the Tasmanian Emergency Information Service, and Service Tasmania offices in Hobart, Launceston and Burnie. In an unusually long deployment, our volunteers were greatly appreciated and highly valued.

Training

A training day was held with 20 participants from 9 LGA's and representing 7 denominations/faiths at St Clement's Anglican Church in Kingston on 31st May. Our usual trainer, Margaret Savage, was unavailable so Paul Hueston stepped into that role for the day. It was a very worthwhile and productive day with some brilliant people now on the journey to be accredited volunteers with TCCEM.

AVECA

The Australian Volunteer Emergency Chaplaincy Alliance, of which TCCEM is a member, is an increasingly strong and active collective across state and territory jurisdictions. AVECA arranged a speaking tour of Dr Naomi Paget one of the world's foremost authorities on crisis chaplaincy in Sydney and Melbourne in July. Dr Paget presented three days of seminars (Operational Stress First Aid; Managing Relationships During Crisis; and Resilience for Stress Management. Paul Hueston attended in Sydney and Gus Yearsley & 2 Volunteers attended in Melbourne.

Connections with LGA's

Our project "Enhanced access to a more resilient pastoral care service across Tasmanian local government areas" had us engaged with Mayors and/or council Emergency Management Coordinators in 15 local councils, with a very positive reception.

Go Kits and Jackets

TCCEM received a federal government Volunteers Grant to purchase warm jackets for our volunteers and to double our number of Go Kits to six. The new jackets will be kept with the Go Kits and be available to volunteers on deployment.

Hobart Airport Chaplaincy

This chaplaincy service is progressing well and is greatly appreciated by Airport staff. Hobart Airport has announced a Terminal Expansion Project that will significantly increase the size of the terminal and facilitate international flights. TCCEM is well positioned to offer support over the next three years of this building project, which will undoubtedly be a busy and stressful time for many. The chaplaincy service has been boosted by a grant from the Tasmanian Christian Fund that contributed to our goal to raise \$100k by July 5 this year.

Schools Sunday is an initiative of the Tasmanian Council of Churches, supported by Scripture Union Tasmania.



Two candidates nominated for WCC general secretary



The search committee appointed by the central committee to prepare the election of the next general secretary of the World Council of Churches met this week, and has informed the moderator of the central committee, Dr Agnes Aboum, about the results of their work. The position will be vacant as of 1 April 2020 since the present general secretary Rev. Dr Olav Fykse Tveit, announced to the central committee in June 2018, that he would not stand for re-election for a third period after having served two five-year terms.

The search committee has, through its moderator Prof Dr Fernando Enns, informed the moderator of the central committee, that they have finished the search process and interviews, and concluded by consensus to propose two names to the central committee for the upcoming election of the next general secretary of the WCC.
